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Reading: Luke 4:1-13

Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, left the Jordan and was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, where for forty days he was tempted by the devil. He ate nothing during those days, and at the end of them he was hungry. The devil said to him, "If you are the Son of God, tell this stone to become bread." Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Man shall not live on bread alone.'"

The devil led him up to a high place and showed him in an instant all the kingdoms of the world. And he said to him, "I will give you all their authority and splendour; it has been given to me, and I can give it to anyone I want to. If you worship me, it will all be yours."

Jesus answered, "It is written: 'Worship the Lord your God and serve him only."

The devil led him to Jerusalem and had him stand on the highest point of the temple. "If you are the Son of God," he said, "throw yourself down from here. For it is written:

"'He will command his angels concerning you to guard you carefully; they will lift you up in their hands, so that you will not strike your foot against a stone."

Jesus answered, "It is said: 'Do not put the Lord your God to the test."

When the devil had finished all this tempting, he left him until an opportune time.

Talk by Mike Norris – "Be true to your heart"

Opening question: What Books That You Have Read Had Most Impact On You (other than the Bible!)?

If I asked you, what ten books have you read that have struck you most, which ones would be on the list? Mine would have to be; To The Lighthouse by Virginia Woolf, Birthday Letters by Ted Hughes, and The Top 5 regrets of the dying by Bronnie Ware, written by a woman caring for those who were on the verge of death. The most common regret of those facing death is: "I wish I'd had the courage to live a life true to myself, not the life others expected of me".

Why am I telling you that? I am telling you that because we are continuing on with our series "Emotional First Aid" in which we are exploring emotional and spiritual health. We are doing that because we recognise that the pandemic has put us under huge emotional strain. We're using Peter Scazzero's book "Emotionally Healthy Spirituality", and I'm basing what I say on chapter 2 of the book about becoming your authentic self.

Emotional and Spiritual health is CRUCIAL (especially in this pandemic). Remember that Peter says many people's Christians struggle with very poor emotional health and feel depressed. They don't experience the joy

or life or peace that Jesus offers. Peter sees this as a discipleship issue, and thinks that lots of our contemporary approaches to discipleship even undermine our emotional health (but I won't repeat what I said last week).

Peter Scazzero says you need to be clear: **you can't experience good emotional health without knowing yourself.** Sometimes in church, we think that discipleship is just about knowing God – this isn't that healthy – it's about knowing God and knowing yourself.

This combination is not a new idea. Augustine wrote in his work *Confessions* in AD400 "*How can you draw close to God when you are far from your own self?*"He prayed: "*Grant Lord, that I may know myself that I may know thee.*" John Chrysostom, the Archbishop are Constantinople says: "*Find the door of your heart, you will discover it's the door of the kingdom of God.*" Saint Theresa of Avila right in *The Way of Perfection* writes: "*Almost all problems in the spiritual life stem from a lack of self-knowledge.*" John Calvin says in the opening of his institutes of the Christian religion: "*Our wisdom consists almost entirely of two parts: the knowledge of God and of ourselves. But as these are connected together by many ties, it is not easy to determine which of the two proceed to and gives birth to the other."*

So, do you know yourself? According to Bronnie Ware, most people don't and it's their biggest regret because it stops them living life they could live. It's crucial for a Christian – we need to know ourselves to become the person God has created us to be.

How do you resolve to get to know yourself so that you can be yourself?

This is really tough! I've found it tough in my life, and I encourage my sons to do this in a book I wrote for them. EE Cummings said, "To be nobody-but-yourself — in a world which is doing its best, night and day, to make you everybody else — means to fight the hardest battle which any human being can fight."

Lies at the heart of following Jesus as we become new creations when we come to faith. The apostle Paul urges us "to put off your old self... and put on the new self, created to be like God in true righteousness and holiness." (Ephesians 4:22, 24). The pressure on us to live a life that is not our own is also great. Powerful generational forces and spiritual warfare work against us. Yet living faithfully to our true self in Christ represents one of the great tasks of discipleship.

How do you get in touch with your emotions?

I don't know if you're emotional, I'm not! It's often taught in Church that emotions are a bit unreliable and not to be trusted. "But when we deny our pain, losses, and feelings year after year, we become less and less human. We transform slowly into empty shells with shiny faces painted on them. Sad to say, that is the fruit of much of our discipleship in our churches. "For me, a revolution in my spirituality was unleashed when I began to allow myself to feel a wider range of emotions, including sadness, depression, fear and anger. The third most common regret is "I wish I'd had the courage to express my feelings".

It's important to remember that God is emotional.

- 1. He feels delight when He created world mankind and animals "God so that it was good... Very good" (Genesis 1:25, 31).
- **2.** He feels disturbed "the Lord regretted that he'd made human beings on the Earth and his heart was deeply troubled" (Genesis 6:6).
- 3. He feels jealous "I the lord your God am a jealous God" (Exodus 20:5).
- **4.** He feels love "I have loved you with an everlasting love; I have drawn you with kindness". (Jeremiah 31:3)
- 5. He feels sorrow and trouble "my soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death." (Matthew 26:37–38)
- 6. He feels joy when Jesus sends out the 72 "...at that time Jesus full of joy through the holy spirit...)" (Luke 10:21)

Therefore, we will be emotional too, because we're made in His image. Recently, I've been writing down 3 emotions which I feel in the morning as I try to grow in this. I'm documenting what I'm feeling, not what I think I should feel, or what I want to feel.

How do you find security in your Heavenly Father's love?

This is the key to knowing yourself and being the person that God created you to be. Remember, Jesus' true self was founded in the love and delight and approval of his Father – just as our true self is found in the love delight and approval of our heavenly Father. His Father spoke these words over his life at his baptism: "This is my son, who my love; with him I'm well pleased." (Matthew 3:17). In other words, 'you're lovable, you're good; it is so good that you exist!' Jesus himself had to resist the temptation to give into the demands to be someone else and end up living out of a false self

Jesus faced three temptations. At their heart was losing his true self.

1. He had to resist the temptation to walk away from his true self and find his identity in success (*l am what l do*)

The devil said to Jesus, "if you are the son of God, tell this stone to become bread." Jesus had done nothing for 30 years. He hasn't got his ministry, nobody believes in Him. He was hungry. What contribution has he made to the world? Nothing. He was a loser.

Have you just demonstrated your usefulness? What do you do? We often think we are worthwhile only if we have scored sufficient success in church, work, family, or a relationship.

Lockdown has been tough. For many, work has dried up and it's easy for us to feel like failures. This isn't true. Interestingly, of the four regrets of dying, the second was "I wish I hadn't worked so hard". And just as easy as the temptation from professional success is that of Christian success too – it's very common

2. He had to resist the temptation to walk away from His true self and find His identity in His possessions (*lam what I have*)

Jesus was taken see all the magnificence and power of the Earth. The devil said to him "I will give you all of their authority and splendour if you worship me. It all will be yours". There is a huge pressure in Surrey, and Guildford (one of the wealthiest towns in the country). The Bible says, "Foxes have dens and birds have nests, but the Son of Man has no place to lay his head." (Matthew 8:20)

3. He had to resist the temptation to walk away from His true self and find His identity in popularity (/ am what other people think)

The devil led him to Jerusalem and took him to the highest point of the temple: "If you are the son of God throw yourself down from here..." It's like a publicity stunt. Jesus lives out of his true self. He faced crushing expectations from disciples, Romans, everyone he came across, which he ignored. He refused to live out of his false self.

In living out of his true self, he disappointed a lot of people – he was secure in his Father's love and so could withstand huge pressure people put on him. He disappointed his family. They thought he had gone mad (Mark 3:21). He disappointed the people he grew up with in Nazareth (Luke 4:28-39; remember they tried to kill him when he told them he was the Messiah)

He disappointed his closest friends, the twelve disciples. They had their own ideas about what he should be like and what sort of a Messiah he should be. As a result, they end up betraying him (Judas) or deserting him (the rest). Jesus did not hold that against them. He disappointed the crowds on many occasions. They just wanted miracles, great sermons and for him to bash up Romans. Jesus did not

hold that against theme disappointed religious leaders, and they did not like his radical nature and so ended up killing him

"Jesus was not selfless. He did not live as though **only** other people counted. He knew his value and worth. He had friends. He asked people to help him. At the same time Jesus was not selfish. He did not live as though **nobody else** counted. He gave his life out of love for others. From a place of loving union with his Father, Jesus has a mature healthy true self"

How can you practically live in your Father's love?

1. Each day, spend some time in silence and solitude

Each day, have a time in silence and notice your emotions before God. Silence and solitude are so foundational to emotional health and spirituality that they are demonstrated by all the biblical greats from David to Jesus to all the bright men and women who have gone before us.

2. Find some people you can totally be yourself with

You can only share less of your false self if you have a few trusted companions to help you. This may be your POD group at church (if you're not in a POD and would like to be, do contact the church office!)

The fourth most common regret on dying is "I wish I had stayed in touch with my friends."

3. Pray for courage. This is tough – but worth it!
